

Jane Sapp: Program Director, The Encampment for Citizenship

Jane Sapp is a musician and cultural worker with deep roots in the gospel music traditions of the American south. A musician of enormous power and talent, Jane Sapp was a Civil Rights Movement leader, and has worked in schools and community centers for decades. Most recently, she



worked as a cultural facilitator with the newly forming foundation, the Southern Partners Fund, and also undertook documentation of activists in the rural south who were grantees of the Bert and Mary Meyer Foundation.

The Encampment for Citizenship

The Need for the Encampment for Citizenship (EFC) has never been greater.

We stand at a time in the US and the world not unlike the 1930s when fascism and extremism segregated our worlds to the point of extraordinary violence, civil unrest, and cynicism about the possibility of social justice. We need young people ready and able to lead as skilled and experienced peace and community builders.

In the wake of the horrors of World War II, an organization was founded on the core idea that, "young people can be a positive force for change in their communities." That organization is the Encampment for Citizenship, and we continue to believe that when young people develop critical thinking skills, youth activism, leadership qualities and the courage to break free from stereotypes, they become a powerful catalyst for change at every level of society.

It is clear to us that the struggle for democratic engagement and for economic and social equality is as vital now as it was when the EFC was founded in 1946. However, we recognize that methods of preparing young people for civic engagement must respond to the current manifestations of injustice and inequality.




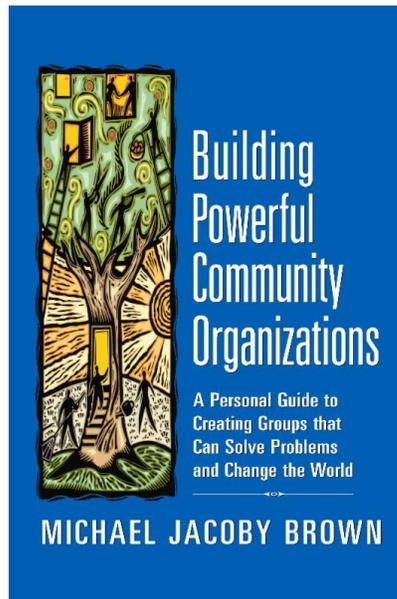
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
